I attended the 'ordination of service' of one of my candidacy committee contacts. I walked with her throughout her seminary years and it was very cool to see her get ordained, to become a pastor of the church. It brought back memories of my ordination 12 years ago.

As I sat there at the service, I was struck by something. We make a very big deal when someone becomes a pastor and maybe we should. God has called this person to serve out their vocation in the church and a congregation has validated that call. It is a special thing. But frankly, the call to be a pastor is no more special than any other vocational call.

Often people think that pastors are somehow *super-holy* people, almost like we have some sort of super power that allows us to be a pastor. I know that I felt like that really up until college. But in reality, a pastor's call is no more special or important than the person who is called to read in church, or usher, or teach Sunday School, or weed the garden. It is no more important than the church council member or fellowship server or a choir member. As a vocation, being a pastor is no more holy than those that are called to be farmers or teachers or factor workers or stay-at home mom's or lawyers or any other profession out there.

It is no different because we are all sinners, redeemed by the grace of Jesus Christ, and called to use our gifts in service to our Savior in the world. I'm called specifically to a ministry of word and sacrament; but your call, your vocation, is just as important, both inside and outside of the church walls. It is not only a pastor who can proclaim the love of God in Jesus Christ. We all do, in our way, and we can, no matter where we are. We are called, we are all are sent, we are all God's servants in the world. For that we can say, "Thanks be to God!" Amen.



Narrative Lectionary Stories for September 2014

September 7: Genesis 6:16-22, 9:8-15: Flood and Promise

Humankind was wicked in Noah's day. So wicked, in fact, God regretted having made human beings. So God made the decision to destroy humanity. But God loved the rest of God's creation. God chose Noah to be the one to care for God's creation while the rest of humanity suffered for its sin. Something changed in God, however, while Noah and his family were caring for the animals and vegetation on the ark. God decided to give humankind another chance through the descendants of Noah. When the flood ended and the water receded, God remembered Noah and his family. God placed a bow in the sky as a reminder to God that God promised never again to destroy humankind by flood for its wickedness.

September 14: Genesis 12:1-9: Call of Abraham

God promised Abraham land. Abraham was a nomad, a wanderer in the desert with few possessions. Land would have been an unlikely blessing. But throughout his life he continued to encounter kings and others who feared Abraham's God and gave him possessions and land to keep Abraham's God from punishing them. God promised Abraham descendants. Although he and his wife, Sarah, were old, and Sarah was barren, God gave them a baby, Isaac. Through Isaac, a great nation was born. Nothing is too great for God to accomplish. God promised to bless Abraham so that Abraham would be a blessing to the world. Indeed, through Abraham's descendants King David, and then Jesus Christ came to this world. The whole world has been blessed through Abraham, as we continue to receive those blessings even today.

September 21: Genesis 39:1-23: Joseph in Prison

Joseph's life had many ups and downs. He was born into a life of enough means to get by fairly well. But then his jealous brothers sold him into slavery. In slavery he rose to the head of household, where he enjoyed many privileges, but then his owner's jealous wife made up a terrible lie that landed him in jail. In prison he rose to the head of the ranks of prisoners, where he enjoyed many privileges, but people in power forgot about him and he remained in prison many years. When finally he was released, he rose to the top of Pharaoh's governing board, where again he enjoyed many privileges. Throughout all his highs and lows in life, God remained faithful to him. God's blessings became apparent, not explicitly because Joseph himself seemed blessed, but that others were blessed through Joseph. This blessing of others echoes the promise of his ancestor, Abraham, whom God promised would be "blessed to be a blessing" to the world. Indeed, Joseph was a blessing to the world despite his own life's circumstance.

September 28: Exodus 14:10-14, 21-29: Rescue at the Sea

God's people, Israel, were slaves in Egypt for over 400 years. They prayed for deliverance. Finally, God heard and answered their prayers. God sent Moses to help free the people from slavery. Once set free from Egypt, the people fled. But Pharaoh changed his mind, and set out after the people with the plan of bringing them back to Egypt. When the people came to the Red Sea, it appeared they were trapped. But God held Pharaoh's armies back with pillars of fire and cloud. Then God parted the sea with a strong east wind so that the dry land appeared, and the people crossed safely. God allowed Pharaoh's armies to follow, then clogged their chariot wheels to slow down their pursuit long enough to trap them in the seabed. Once trapped, God released the waters and the armies were drowned and washed away. God's people were truly free. God had delivered them from slavery.





The Labor to Which We're Called

In words attributed to Mother Teresa, "Many people mistake our work for our vocation. Our vocation is the love of Jesus." As we celebrate Labor Day, what does such a distinction mean?

Vocation comes from Latin for "calling." Christians understand vocation as that for which God created you, involving activities you do well, enjoy and feel good about doing, and that serve others. If you're blessed to earn a paycheck doing something that fits those categories, then your profession or occupation — your work —likely is your vocation.

Other people work a paying job because an opportunity presents itself and the income is needed, even if it isn't their favorite thing to do. Perhaps they live out their truest vocation during non-employment hours: singing with a choir, raising children, building houses with Habitat for Humanity.

Christians in any capacity, paid or not, can live out Jesus' calling to love God and neighbor with our whole being (Luke 10:27). When God is "CEO" of our lives, it shows in how we treat our fellow laborers.



REMINDER BOARD
